## **Aquatic- Do not plant/Invasive**

\*\*\*There are many other invasive aquatics, and plants listed under the above categories, I have listed the more well known or prevalent species. They can be seen on the website for the Pennsylvania Department of Conservation and Natural Resources under Invasive plants to Pennsylvania. Invasive plants are a threat to our native ecological system, which is why it is very important to remove if possible and never plant them.

## **Bamboos- Running and Clumping**

\*\*\* Running Bamboos are **NOT PERMITTED TO BE PLANTED** under any circumstance!! Running Bamboos after a couple seasons in the ground send out very strong fibrous running rhizomes. Some species up to 15 feet a year, they can penetrate terra cotta sewer lines, water lines, cracks in foundations, storm water pipes, get under sidewalks and anywhere the rhizome can squeeze into. They will grow out and into several neighboring properties and are extremely difficult to remove. Due to their size and aggressive nature, running Bamboo requires a commercial backhoe or tractor to dig down and remove all parts of the plant. If any rhizome is left in the ground it will start to grow back immediately. Below are a few sites you can visit to read more in depth information about the different types of Bamboos.

Clumping Bamboos are just the opposite, these typically grow much slower and stay contained in one area as their type suggests, in a clump. There are also many different species and varieties available, this type of Bamboo is permitted to be planted in the City of Easton.
